Roger's Ramblings

It's been a bit of a busy few weeks since the last newsletter.

Ceramicus11 closed on 11 September and I can report on the results but before doing so I would like to acknowledge again the considerable efforts of those who willing gave of their time to make it a success, in particular: Mia Hamilton, assisted by Sue Scobie in setting up, Vera Burton for writing up the catalogue, looking after the refreshments and many other things, Paula Weir, Andy Rattenbury and Mia who looked after receiving and helping the selector, Rhonda Edwards for drawing up the roster and Joe Zaccarello and Mike Atkins who were our two barmen. And, of course, our partner in the exhibition, watercolour artist Alfred Memelink who shared costs with us.

Stats: Forty nine members submitted 188 pieces of which 138 were exhibited with a total value of \$18,836 (not including the guest artist's work) and 46 sold for \$6,516. Sales were down on previous years despite large numbers going to the World Press Photos exhibition next door and the large numbers attending the concurrent WoW exhibition and RWC at the Stadium. Nevertheless, it was a good show and the record number of votes for the Viewers Choice prize indicated good numbers attending. The prize went to Sue Scobie (for the second year in a row -trying for a hat trick next year, Sue?). The Selector's Award went to Paul Melser from over the hill in Carterton. Congratulations, Paul.

This year, in addition to the exhibition, we decided to raise money for the Christchurch Red Cross Earthquake Appeal and sold beer mugs made and donated by our members, the Otaki Potters and 35 Unomis (Japanese goblets) donated by Anneke Borren. Many thanks to all you donors for your very generous input. During the exhibition mug and unomi sales totalled \$3780 so, together with the proceeds of a sale of surplus pottery items at the rooms, the committee has agreed to make the donation up to \$4,000.

On the financial side this year we dropped press advertising and relied on flyers, our two large banners and web notices to promote the show. By so doing we saved almost \$1,000. This, plus sharing costs with Alfred and a \$1,000 grant from Wellington City Council's Cultural Pool helped to keep our loss down to roughly \$330 (not all accounts are in yet).

So that's it for another year. However, the committee has already booked the Academy Galleries for next year's exhibition (opening night Friday 12 October and closing Sunday, 21 October) and it is likely we will hold Ceramicus12 in conjunction with Watercolour New Zealand.

Sale Day. On Saturday, 17 September we held a small Sale Day with the stall manned by Vera Burton, Mike Atkins and myself. Items included those donated by Patti Meads, a long time Life Member, and Jock Fleming, who passed away last month, plus items no longer needed by the club. I would not say we were rushed off our feet but we did raise \$130 and the committee has put that towards the Earthquake Appeal.

Working Bee on Sunday, 25 September was very well attended and much was achieved despite the intermittent rain. The exterior steps are no longer slippery as Mal Sole water-blasted the ***out of them and the edges are now painted white; Alan Ross, Mike Atkins and Mauritz Basson raised the storeroom door sill to stop it flooding in heavy rain and poured a concrete ramp, Mauritz and I replaced rotten timber beams supporting the roof; they will need another coat or two of paint. ANY VOLUNTEERS??

Inside, the stinky job of emptying the sludge buckets upstairs and down was tackled without complaint by two members, Joe Zaccarello and Vanessa (she is so new a member her surname is not on my members list; Vanessa came all the way from Featherston!). The kitchen and frig are once again spotless, the batts clean and tidy, ware shelves tidied up, wheels in pristine condition and rubbish (including stuff on 'Death Row') has gone to the tip. Downstairs Gwyn Williams and Kate Pullar tackled the job of sorting out the glaze room. Unclaimed materials and glazes belonging to members and that have been languishing there for ages have been recycled into the club's stock. Now it is possible walk into the glaze room without have climb over buckets etc.

The shared meal (thanks to those generous ones who provided it) was a pleasant way for us to meet and get to know the new members. There were others who worked hard actively doing things and I apologise to any who have not been mentioned. Thank you, your efforts contributed to a very good result. LET'S HOPE ALL MEMBERS WILL TRY A LITTLE HARDER IN THE COMING MONTHS TO KEEP THINGS AS GOOD THEY ARE NOW. And last but not least we have a brand new electric stove in the kitchen. No more burnt meals!!

Mia Hamilton, one of our two Potters in Residence and who has been looking after kiln bookings has a major commission at the Auckland Botanic gardens and will be away for a few weeks. In the meantime I will look after the bookings. I am sure it is all running smoothly now but any urgent problems call me.

Vivian, our other PIR, and tutor for the Onslow College classes on Monday and Tuesday evenings will be off during the fourth term as she has to have remedial surgery on her thumb. Mauritz Basson and Kate Pullar will share the teaching for Term Four. Good luck Vivian and speedy recovery.

As the notice referred to at the beginning explains, we have decided to change to mid-fire clay and firings. To that end we needed to adjust our range of stoneware glazes to vitrify at Cone 6. Rosemary O'Hara has taken on this task and done a great job that has involved a considerable amount of time and effort experimenting and testing the glazes to make sure they work. That job is now largely finished and the new mid-fire glaze buckets will be clearly marked with test tiles attached. Very many thanks, Rosemary, for that job well done. Unmodified glazes will be around for a while for members to use but will not be replaced as they run out.

It was great to receive an email recently from Roger Brown, our former editor, now living in Blenheim. He wrote to say how much Sheila, his wife who is in a rest home in Blenheim, likes to hear of the happenings of the club through our newsletter. Take a bow Saskia and those who contribute material.

Treasurer. Now a serious plea: we need someone to be the Treasurer. For the past year the job has been handled jointly by Robyn Connolly who deals with the cash and banking and Dave Smissen who pays the accounts and records data using the MYOB software. Changes to Club Firings

The committee has decided that in order to reduce the costs of maintaining the club's kilns and reduce the amount of electricity used the standard club firings are to be changed to mid-fire that is, to fire to Cone 6 with a top temperature of 1240°C. This will apply to the club firings only that is, the Tuesday firings. This does not mean that stoneware firings will cease as members will still be able to hire kilns to fire their own work as they do now.

Timing of the Change

The complete change to mid-fire will be take place at the end of this year and the final club ('Tuesday') stoneware firing will be in the week before Christmas. However, as demand for mid-fire firings picks up then there may well be a mix of both firings from 1 October.

Classes

Classes may continue to use stoneware clays until the end of this year. It will be up to tutors as to when they change to mid-fire clay. Tutors are responsible for their class firings and class work is not to go into club firings.

Clay

The club is currently trialing a mid-fire clay. A notice will be put up in the rooms shortly advising the name and cost of the clay that is chosen. In the meantime members might like to try out the recycled clay that is now blended with 10% earthenware and 90% stoneware as a trial to bring the maturing temperature down. The cost remains \$7 a bag.

Kiln Room

Separate areas of the shelves will be identified for mid-fire and stoneware glaze work.


Potters profile: Paul Melser



Born 1947 Dunedin. I became interested in pots at age ten while resident at Ardmore Teachers College where my father was an English lecturer. Peter Stitchbury, who kindly allowed me to use the wheels and clay after school, ran the pottery. After moving to Wellington I built my first effective kiln (age 14) on the side of a hill in Evans Bay with the advice of Roy Cowan. While living in Wellington, I worked informally with Roy, Helen Mason and other Wellington potters and spent a short time during school holidays at Barry Brickell's Pottery in Coromandel.

I moved to Featherston in the Wairarapa in 1966 and started making pots full time aged nineteen. In 1974 I moved further north (between Masterton and Carterton) to my present home which is very close to the Holdsworth National Park. Many visitors drop in either to or from a walk in this magnificent forest

Park. I live with my partner on fifty hectares of land, which includes pottery, farm, cricket pitch and trees that we have planted over the last thirty years.



Hans Coper) and to Eastern traditions (Bernard Leach, Harry Davis, Hamada and other Japanese visitors to New Zealand) continued through my formative and subsequent productive years. I have always been equally interested in efficient production techniques and in the durability, simplicity

and functional efficiency of the work produced.



Over time, my work has become less decorated and more concerned with expressing the materials and process I use in production. I have gas and wood-fired kilns, manufacture my own clay (with local and imported ingredients) and produce all my own glazes. My production fits within a stoneware tradition that dates back two or three thousand years and endeavours to fulfil the same domestic needs as those predecessor potters. It has been very important for all those potters, as it is for me, to produce work that fulfills the contemporary needs of their customers. I make modern functional pots using contemporary technology and machinery at the same time as employing work methods which have been used historically.

All of the pots I make are available in ten different glazes. I make more than fifty different pots and endeavour to keep all of these available in each separate glaze.

Hazel Calderwood

Many of our older members will be saddened to learn of Hazel's death recently.

I first met Hazel as a potter, but in no time at all she became my friend and colleague. She joined one of my pottery classes at Onslow College at a time when the classes were growing very quickly. Too much for 1 person, so in 1988 Hazel joined me in teaching them. We had a wonderful time teaching. We enjoyed the students and their challenges. Basically I organised, Hazel empathised. She seemed to know just what people wanted - and not everyone wanted to be a potter. We had many foreign language students, mainly women, who not only learned pottery but could get help and advice on anything worrying them. We also had many women wanting time out from their families - with a bit of clay therapy. Hazel was the one who always knew what was going on and what was needed.



Onslow College had an exchange scheme with a Japanese school. Our college students going there came back with all manner of craft work they had done, so we decided we had to reciprocate. We developed a series of 3 classes so that in 10 days the visiting

students produced, fired and glazed 3 items. The hit was always the little sheep complete with pottery wool - all given different expressions, many of them smiling, occasionally adorned with a blue bow! This was a very rewarding project we did together for 18 years!

Hazel was a very active member of Wellington Potters Association. She served on the committee for awhile and was responsible for the newsletter distribution, and the exhibition roster for a long time.







She could always be absolutely relied on to help with any project, but she was always especially keen on raku and pit firings. Some of her best work was her beautifully finished and burnished pit fired pottery. One of her large carved terracotta balls featured at her funeral.

When Hazel and Gus shifted up the coast Hazel got involved with Otaki Potters and again taught adult classes at the college. It was while she was teaching there that she was presented with an award for tutoring excellence by the Wellington branch of the Community Learning Association through schools. It was richly deserved.

Hazel it is a privilege to have known and worked with you and have you as a friend. Thanks for your enthusiastic support of the Association for 25 years.

How to buy clay

New clay is kept under lock and key in the storeroom. The rooms manager, president and treasurer have keys. Clay is available for purchase on Tuesdays between 10am and 2pm. Please pay immediately. Note that we can't give change or receipts. Please also note that you are able to purchase clay through Dave Smissen when he is at the rooms.

Abbots Stoneware: \$22 Traditional buff stoneware.

Abbots Sculptural: \$26

Grogged stoneware, suitable for raku or sculptural work. Low shrinkage. Oatmeal buff colour in oxidation, brown in reduction. Firing range: cone 8-10.

Abbots Red: \$22

Fine, plastic earthenware. Orange terracotta colour at maturity. 50mesh. Firing range: cone 03-2 (1100-1150).

Red Raku (12.5kg): \$26

Great for hand building. Grog content of about 30%. Pale terracotta colour. Won't take glaze all that well. Firing range: cone 03-5

PCW (Potters Clay White): \$36

A versatile, pale grey-firing (grey in reduction) stoneware body with excellent throwing characteristics. Suits many applications (including raku firings because of a good thermal shock resistance). 80 mesh. Drying shrinkage 5-8%, total when fired about 16%. Firing range: cone 9-10 (1257-1282 degrees centigrade).

W10 (10kg): \$23

White clay with a firing range from earthenware to stoneware (similar to Abbots white). (Members using this are impressed with its texture for throwing)

Primo white stoneware (10kg): \$20 Primo buff stoneware (10kg): \$20

Recycled clay: \$7 per bag
