November has been a busy month at the rooms, with classes from Wellington Community Education Centre running on Monday and Tuesday evenings with Nicola Dench and Mauritz Basson as well as Shige's class on Wednesday afternoons, Nicola's kids' classes on Tuesday as well as Anthea's classes on Friday and Saturday mornings.

The first weekend of November the club hosted a workshop by renowned ceramic artist Aaron Scythe. Back in New Zealand after more than a decade and half living and working in Japan, it was a privilege to all participants to learn new, exciting and challenging techniques for working with clay. The rooms were at full capacity with 14 members attending the workshop, plus a few of our regulars working in the remaining available tables. Please remember to check the club's programme printed in the newsletter as well as the monthly calendar at the room's whiteboard to get all the news regarding classes and workshops.

By the time you receive this newsletter the working bee on Sunday 29th November will have taken place. A big thanks to all those present for your input and for donating to the club your time and skills. For those who were nowhere to be seen, don't worry, there is still a chance to give back to your club at the next working bee.

As you all know the club sells clay at the rooms. This is a service to all, it saves you money and time. At the moment we offer three types of clay: Mac's White 20 KG bags at \$46; Abbots Stoneware 20 KG bags at \$23 and Abbots Brick Red 20 KG bags at \$28 each. Please make sure you pay for clay on the day of the purchase, and also that you fill in the blue folder, kept on the kiln room bench, with the necessary information. Help our treasurer to trace your transactions by keeping payment details clear and up to date.

As Christmas is almost here please remember that the last club firing is on December 15. So finish all your Christmas presents early to avoid disappointment. As part of our end of year clean up and due to the installation of a new ventilation system, please remember to finish and take home with you by December 24 all your work, glaze and equipment.



Aaron Scythe Workshop Review

On 7 & 8 November Aaron Scythe gave a 2 day workshop during which he demonstrated his Oribe inspired style of pottery, showing his spontaneous and playful throwing and decorating techniques. Aaron lived in Japan for 16 years and returned to New Zealand with his family, following the 2011 devastating earthquake.



Aaron was highly inspiring, and although his major source of influence is 16th century Japanese traditional tea ceremony wares, he offers a refreshing alternative to more prescribed ways of creating. The workshop was punctuated with demos between which participants were given time to practice on making "wobbly" tea bowls, water bowls, vases, sake bottles etc, throwing two or 3 parts separately and joining them together on





the wheel afterwards. Aaron uses carved plaster bats to throw on, making an imprint on the base (which doesn't always remain the base in the finished piece!). Carved pieces of clay of different shapes and sizes are also added to the vessels for decorative and/or functional purposes (handles, repair patches or just added interest).

Aaron also showed his playful way of decorating pots with white slip and iron oxide paint, incorporating slipped pieces into a yet to be fully assembled vessel, creating interesting merging and bleed.

It was a challenge to all, in the sold out workshop, but also an amazingly freeing and renewing experience. Participants were encouraged to let go, try something new and be open to "mistakes" and what they might learn from them. Aaron was a pleasure to have around and learn from. The creative stimulation was such that many were mentally, creatively and physically exhausted, but elated, inspired and changed. A new way of thinking, practising and living.

We hope to see more of Aaron in the future and are already looking forward to the next workshop.

We are offering an opportunity for a potter who would like to use the Potters in Residence studio at Wellington Potters' Rooms for a 3-month period, from January till the end of April 2015. It offers a period of time for concentrated work, to do some experimenting, get together a body of work, or prepare for an exhibition..... whatever your goal.

The offer is open to local and overseas potters.

We offer

- A free studio
- A stretch of time to work on your own work
- The opportunity to contribute to the life of Wellington Potters

The conditions are negotiable, but would include:

- A 4-month residency, with no right of renewal
- Becoming a member of WPA if you are not already one
- Attendance at the rooms for at least 20 hours a week
- A plan of the work you intend to do
- A requirement that you run a workshop for club members
- A commitment to assist with some aspect of the club's work making glazes or firing, etc
- While the studio is rent free, you would pay for your own materials and expenses.

Costs: Lyon to Paris \$4,300, includes:

- Gallery and museum entries
- Music concert tickets
- Pottery workshops
- All travel during the 2-week tour, including train Lyon to Paris.


